

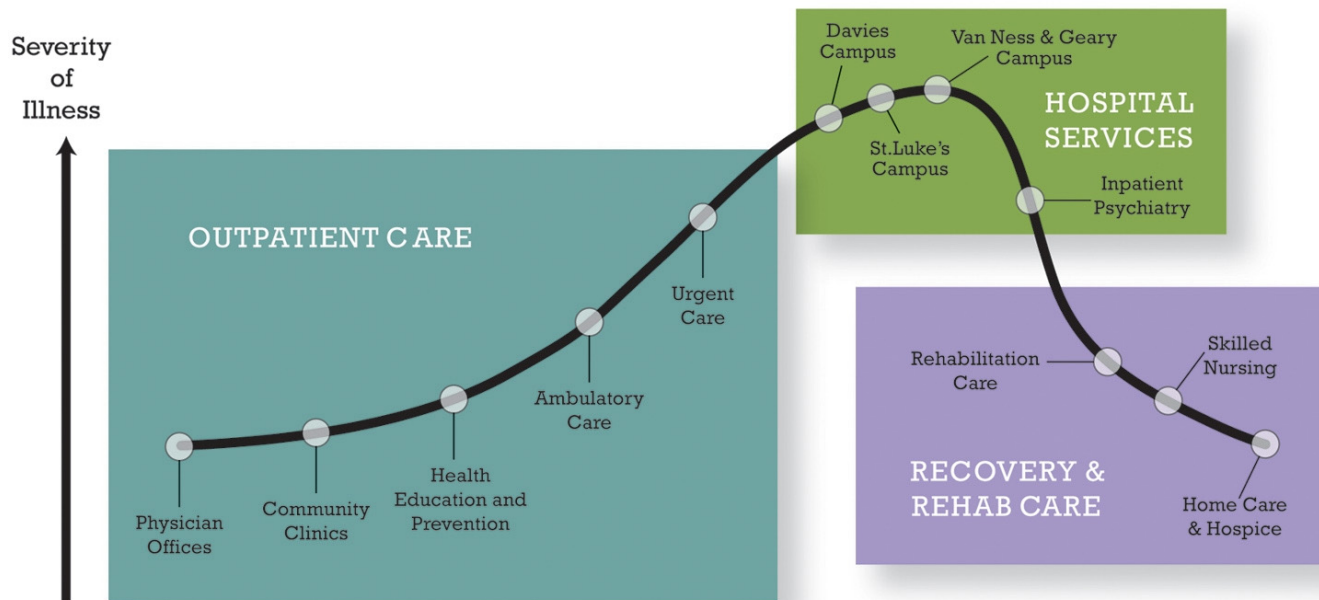

Our Citywide System of Care

California Pacific Medical Center, which provides health care for more than 40% of San Francisco patients, plans to modernize our system of care while meeting new state earthquake safety mandates. We plan to build two state-of-the-art acute care hospitals, one centrally located at Van Ness and Geary and one at our St. Luke's Campus, and to complete a major renovation at our Davies Campus. Our citywide plan will double the number of earthquake safe beds in San Francisco, improve privacy and infection control by creating all single patient rooms, inject \$2.5 billion into the economy while creating 1,500 construction jobs, and improve health care access for all San Franciscans. This integrated system of care depends on each component working together to ensure that CPMC can continue to deliver the best hands-on care for this and future generations.

COMMUNITY-BASED OUTPATIENT CARE

Good health begins with access to physicians and clinics for preventive care, and primary and chronic disease management.

Physician Offices

- Today, CPMC is linked to over 1,200 community-based physicians, many of them affiliated with Brown and Toland Physicians or Sutter Pacific Medical Foundation.
- CPMC clinics include a Women's Center, a Pediatric Clinic and a Neighborhood Clinic for adults on the St. Luke's Campus; the Bayview Child Health Center; the Family Health Center on the California Campus; and a Mental Health Clinic on the Pacific Campus. The Kalmanovitz Child Development Center is headquartered in the central city with satellite centers in the Tenderloin, Mission and Bayview Hunters Point.
- Our plan to Rebuild CPMC includes building and renovating medical office buildings on our St. Luke's, Davies and Van Ness & Geary campuses, and opening new practice locations throughout the city.

Community Clinics

- To make the citywide system of care more accessible, CPMC partners with North East Medical Services (NEMS), the St. Anthony Free Medical Clinic, Southeast Health Center, the San Francisco Free Clinic, API Wellness, Lyon-Martin Health Services, Glide Health Services, the Curry Senior Center and many others.
- Our partnership with NEMS provides access to acute care hospital services at CPMC to over 20% of Health San Francisco participants. CPMC will also provide hospital services to Healthy San Francisco patients who select a Brown and Toland physician's office as a medical home.
- CPMC also supports community health through initiatives such as Operation Access, Lions Eye Foundation, the Hep B Free Campaign and Project Homeless Connect.

Health Education and Prevention

- The Community Health Resource Center offers health education, health screenings, nutritional counseling, and social services at CPMC sites and community settings. It offers programs at a reduced fee, sliding scale, or no fee.
- CPMC's Institute for Health & Healing is a center for holistic therapies that support healing and healthier ways of living, both for individuals and communities.
- HealthFirst, a health education and prevention center affiliated with the St. Luke's Health Care Center, is a center for innovation in chronic disease management, using multidisciplinary teams that integrate community health workers.
- CPMC health education and prevention services are also found through the Center for Diabetes Services, the Women's Health Resource Center, and Newborn Connections.

Ambulatory Care

Our ambulatory care system includes specialized diagnostic and treatment services, such as cardiac studies, same-day surgery and radiation therapy. Our plan to Rebuild CPMC concentrates specialized ambulatory services in new and renovated buildings on the Pacific Campus. Our Davies Campus will remain a center for HIV/AIDS, neuroscience, rehabilitation and microsurgical services. The St. Luke's Campus houses children's services, chronic disease management programs, and specialized services for seniors.

Urgent Care

Urgent care centers treat patients who have acute health care problems that do not require a visit to a hospital emergency room. Our plan to Rebuild CPMC includes opening urgent care centers at the Pacific and St. Luke's campuses and partnering with community-based clinics.

HOSPITAL & EMERGENCY SERVICES



CPMC wants our hospitals to continue to be the provider of choice for San Franciscoans, whenever they have an illness or injury requiring inpatient care. Our plan to Rebuild CPMC has this commitment at its heart. We plan to operate three seismically safe, acute care hospitals distributed throughout San Francisco.

St. Luke's Campus

We plan to revitalize the St. Luke's campus and make it the hospital of choice for the southern sector of San Francisco. The proposed hospital includes 80 beds, 50% more emergency room space, and modernized labor and delivery facilities.

Davies Campus

The Davies Campus has already undergone a number of renovations to better serve its patients and physicians. The campus will continue to specialize in health care for people with HIV/AIDS, microsurgery, and rehabilitation care following serious illness or injury.

Proposed Campus at Van Ness & Geary

The proposed campus at Van Ness & Geary will have a 555-bed hospital designed to house both the women's and children's services currently provided at the California Campus and the adult acute care services currently provided at the Pacific campus. In addition, the campus at Van Ness & Geary is planned as a resource for the care of San Francisco's sickest patients and as a regional referral center.

Emergency Services

Emergency services, including psychiatric emergency care, are planned for the St. Luke's, Davies and Van Ness & Geary campuses. These emergency departments serve patients, regardless of ability to pay.

Inpatient Psychiatric Care

The 18 psychiatric inpatient beds in the mental health center on the Pacific Campus will remain open to serve the community.

RECOVERY & REHABILITATION CARE

Health care is oriented to minimizing the time patients must stay in an acute care setting and providing recovery and rehabilitation care outside the hospital walls. Our plan for the future of CPMC includes integrating more home- and community-based services into our system of care, while maintaining licensed hospital beds for patients who need them.

Rehabilitation Care

Rehabilitation care at CPMC offers a wide range of services to restore function after acute events such as stroke, brain or spinal cord injury, cardiac surgery or hip fracture.

- The California Pacific Regional Rehabilitation center on the Davies Campus, rebuilt in 2009, includes acute and post-acute inpatient services for treating patients with life-changing illnesses or injuries. The Archibald/Ehrenberg Rehabilitation Terrain Park, used for both inpatient and outpatient care, is part of this center.
- Outpatient rehabilitation services are provided on both the Davies and Pacific campuses. Programs include physical, speech and occupational therapy, customized to treat each individual's injury or condition.
- CPMC's Cardiac Rehabilitation Program is housed on the Pacific Campus.

Skilled Nursing Care

Each day approximately 87 CPMC patients receive care in our skilled nursing facility (SNF) beds after an acute hospital stay. Today these beds are located in our hospitals on the Davies, St. Luke's and California campuses. Our commitment is to maintain the capacity to meet our demand.

- CPMC will continue to operate 38 inpatient SNF beds at the Davies Campus.
- At least 62 SNF beds will remain in operation at our California Campus and/or St. Luke's Campus until we are successful in creating equivalent new capacity on-campus or in community facilities.
- CPMC is engaged with members of the Long Term Care Coordinating Council to develop transitional care services that bridge the gap between hospital discharge and successful recovery at home.

Home Care and Hospice

CPMC patients often continue their recovery and rehabilitation care at home.

- Sutter VNA & Hospice's services include home infusion therapy, physical, speech and occupational therapy, wound care, respiratory care, and bereavement and grief support.
- Coming Home Hospice is a residential hospice for terminally ill clients and their families.

CPMC's physicians, nurses and staff provide great health care for the people of San Francisco. Our plan to Rebuild CPMC improves and modernizes our facilities. Each pillar of this plan is designed to work together to ensure that CPMC can continue to offer clinical, hands-on excellence to another generation of patients.
